Thoughts from the Rear

I subscribe to "SCUTTLEBUTT" and receive an email most days. I pan through it reading what catches my eye and scroll to the bottom to read the Curmudgeon's Observation. For the last couple of months we have followed the Vendee-Globe, Ellen MacArthur's quest for the around the world record, read about the problems with lightweight boats sailing across the Bass Straits, and the Oryx Quest. These folks are taking what we do on a Tuesday/ Thursday evening to a much higher level. While we would motor out and glance up at the flag at the Yacht Club, tell the crew to go out and check wind direction, then decide to use the #2, these folks have studied the weather patterns weeks ahead and are tracking weather movements and wind strengths,

and planning routes several days ahead for optimum VMG. While during the typical race for us the wind might change 5 knots over the course, they can typically see wind gust change of 20 to 30 knots within a few minutes on the open ocean and will need to make constant major sail changes to keep the boat in trim.

I have been in conditions that they describe, and when you are facing 30 to 50 foot green waves with hurricane force winds blowing the top 3 or 4 feet off the waves, and for every mile you go ahead, you have gone up and down 4 to 5 times that distance. About the fourth day it stops being fun and gets real old. That brings me to the importance of what we learn when we race at our level. Racing causes us to go out onto the race course at a scheduled time and sail a course using all points of sail. We have no say in

what the wind and wave conditions will be during the race time. We learn what sail selection is best for conditions, how to trim the sails, where to position crewmembers at various points of sail to ballast the boat, we learn how the boat responds and that the boat is probably tougher than we are.

I admire the commitment these folks are making to do these major ocean races, and knowing that each of them learned and practiced their sailing skills as club racers. I am happy to be able to join them on their journey by reading the logs and, having sailed, I understand what they are describing and the conditions around and aboard the boat.

Check the Race Schedule for training: SYSCO Race and OCSA Race Management clinics are coming up fast. And mark your planner for July 23-31 for the SYSCO Delta Cruise and/or OCSA Six Pac.

Racing Rules of Sailing 2005 - 2008 ♦ March 25 & 26, 2005

The latest version of the Racing Rules of Sailing (RRS) took effect Jan. 1, 2005, and few sailors know those rules better than Dave Perry. OCSA and its member yacht clubs are pleased to announce a seminar featuring the rules expert. Dave's credentials are impressive:

- Member of the US Sailing Appeals Committee since 1986.
- US Sailing Senior Certified Judge.
- Author of Understanding the Racing Rules of Sailing
- Member, Sailing World Hall of Fame.

Friday evening, 7 to 9 p.m., Dave will conduct a "Mock Protest Hearing," covering all aspects of a protest, including the rules that pertain to filing a protest; the rights of the competitors; and the obligations of the protest committee in conducting the hearing. Those arriving early can catch the "Ask the Expert" open question session from 5-6 p.m.

Saturday, 9 am to 4 pm (social afterwards) will be a full-day seminar on the RRS, including:

- Changes to the 2005 – 2008 RRS
- Discussion of the RRS in general
- Tactics and rules
